# INSPECTIONS AND REPORTS

## Inspections and visits during the Autumn Term

The usual Scarborough College Autumn Term is full of fixtures, a large number of visitors during Open Day and the Sixth Form Open Evening, a whole school theatre production, a half term holiday, a carol service or two and - one would almost forget - a few lessons in between. Cramming these in between early September and mid-December is a tough task in itself.

In addition to the normal flurry of activities, three very special visits added to the business of this bustling term. The Independent Schools Inspectorate (ISI) visited within three weeks of the start of term, causing some extra nerves among many. The Good Schools Guide followed in October and a special visit by agents from all over the world completed the trio of special events in November.

### Inspections, Inspections

The ISI is an independent inspectorate, appointed by the Department of Education, to inspect independent schools in England. Their reports inform the DfE on the extent to which the statutory standards are met. These standards can be found on the ISI website. The full report, and a slightly more abbreviated version can be found, on the College's website.

The Good Schools Guide has been relatively unknown on this part of the northeast coast of England, having never ever visited Scarborough College; something that was immediately picked up by the inspector upon arrival. [The Good Schools Guide](#) is one of the few independent portals for advice and information about schools and education. Schools cannot pay to be included and have no control over which schools are reviewed. The Good Schools Guide report is published, describing Scarborough College, among other things, as: 'Something of an educational pearl.'

### Pupil and Parent Voice

It is important to note that both inspections drew heavily from the feedback received from both parents and students. In both the ISI inspection and the Good Schools Guide inspection, focus groups of both pupils and parents were contacted to ask for their opinion about all aspects of the education, pastoral care and extracurricular activities. While we can publish the parents' or pupils' survey, it is clear that both were received with great humility and pride.

Indeed, much of what formed the inspection results - glowing in both cases - was a direct result of what parents and pupils said about their Scarborough College experiences. Feedback that was honest and yet unbelievably supportive, kind and understanding. One of the reports stated that children were included in everything and felt an important member of the community.

### Fam Trip

Finally, and perhaps most unusual of all, was the BBSN Fam Trip in November. The British Boarding Schools Network connects independent schools with overseas agents, which are crucial to the successful placement of overseas students. Scarborough College is proud to work with a good network of in-market specialists who find the right fit school, organise events and support families with Student Visas and other practical matters.

A fam trip is a great opportunity for schools to open their doors to agents who may not have heard of their school and who may have interest in working together. Scarborough College were selected to host a fam trip from a large number of schools and cooperated with other schools to provide a successful understanding of extracurricular opportunities, education and boarding in the north.

# PRIZE GIVING & SPEECH DAY 2025

Our annual Prize Giving and Speech Day was once again a celebration of the achievements of our students. The event brought together current students, families, governors, staff, and an especially warm gathering of returning Old Scardeburgians.

Throughout the service, the audience enjoyed beautiful performances from the Senior School Choir. There were further musical interludes from incredibly talented Year 13 student Sarah and Year 12 student Connie.

Chair of Governors Mr Guy Robinson opened the event with a balanced review of the academic year, highlighting successes while acknowledging the challenges facing the independent sector.

Headmaster Mr Guy Emmett followed, extending sincere thanks to all staff and students for their dedication throughout the academic year. He also spoke of the very positive outcomes of the recent ISI inspection, noting that the report reflected the College's family spirit, professionalism, and culture of mutual care.

The presentation of prizes and certificates was led by our guest speaker, Mr Roger Black MBE - Olympian, World Champion, and an exceptionally engaging presence. Achievement prizes were awarded to pupils in Years 7-10 and 12, and GCSE certificates to Year 11. A particularly heartwarming moment was the return of so many former Year 13 students, travelling from across the globe to receive their IB Diploma Programme results.

Mr Black's address proved to be one of the highlights of the ceremony. Drawing on experiences from his own sporting career - his early ambitions, injuries, disappointments, and triumphant comebacks - he spoke honestly about the unpredictable nature of success. His key message, that "sometimes what seems like your worst day can end up being the best thing that happens to you," resonated deeply with the audience.

A vote of thanks was delivered by our current Head of School, Anouk, followed by a thoughtful and warmly received speech from last year's Head of School, Toby, now studying languages at Durham University. Toby reflected with humour and gratitude on his eight years at Scarborough College, paying tribute to both current and former staff who helped shape his journey.

The event concluded with a rousing rendition of Jerusalem and the National Anthem before guests made their way back to the College for a celebratory lunch.

Open exclusively to day pupils from the region, the scheme invites children each year to apply for an Academic, All-Rounder, Performing Arts or Sports Scholarship. These awards recognise exceptional potential and hard work, offering scholarships of up to 100% of school fees. The impact of this support is often life-changing; recent Scarborough Scholars have progressed to leading universities including Durham, Warwick and Manchester.

This year, we were encouraged to see a strong level of interest once again, with a brilliant standard of applicants across both scholarship days. Candidates completed assessments in English, Maths and Non-Verbal Reasoning, as well as taking part in interviews and activities designed to showcase their skills and character. It was a pleasure to welcome such a talented group of young people to the College.

We are delighted to share that the Scarborough Scholar for the lower school entry has now been selected, and we are even more pleased that they have chosen to accept the award. At the time of going to print, the Sixth Form scholarship assessments are still underway, and the successful candidate will be announced later this term.

# REMEMBRANCE DAY

**We remember the fallen in both  
Great Wars**

This year's Remembrance Day service at Scarborough College brought together the whole College community to honour those who sacrificed their lives in times of war. Each year, this service holds a special place in the school calendar, offering a moment of collective reflection and gratitude.

Remembrance Day, observed across the United Kingdom on 11 November, marks the armistice that ended the First World War in 1918. It serves as a national moment to remember the men and women who have fallen in conflict, including those from our own school. At Scarborough College, we uphold this tradition to remind our students of the importance of peace, unity and remembrance.

The service began with readings from our Prefects, who spoke about the significance of remembering those who served and the responsibility we carry to honour their legacy. Mr Emmett then led the dedication, reflecting on the members of both Scarborough College and Bramcote School who lost their lives in the wars. The Roll of Honour for both schools was read aloud, a significant act that ensures their names - and their sacrifice - are never forgotten.

Our thanks goes to the Senior Choir, who performed two beautiful pieces: *\*Ndikhokhele Bawo\** and *\*Kyrie Eleison\**, adding to the solemnity of the service.

One of the key moments of the morning came at the end of the service, when Bidding Prayers were read in six different languages by our international students. This powerful gesture highlighted the global nature of our community and underscored the universal hope for peace shared across nations and cultures.

As staff and students quietly filed out of the hall, the entire school observed the traditional two-minute silence, standing together to reflect on the bravery and sacrifice of those who served. The silence served as a moment of unity - an opportunity for each individual to pause, remember and honour.



# SIX: TEEN EDITION

## A show that made “HER”story

To speak plainly, this year’s production, Six: Teen Edition, was amazing. Featuring a cast of twelve female students from Years 9 to 12, the show marked the first time Six has been performed in full in Scarborough - something our performers embraced with confidence. With two alternating casts, the Moss Cast and the Marlow Cast (named after the show’s writers, Toby Marlow and Lucy Moss), the production offered audiences twice the talent.

For those new to Six, the musical retells the stories of the six wives of Henry VIII - Catherine of Aragon, Anne Boleyn, Jane Seymour, Anna of Cleves, Katherine Howard and Catherine Parr - through a pop-concert format. The queens reclaim their narratives, challenging how history has remembered them, each taking the mic to share her side of the story. Empowering and witty, the show’s central theme of women rewriting their own “HER”story resonated powerfully with performers and audience alike.

The staging in Lisvane Hall was imaginative and immersive. Performed in the round, the audience were invited to sit in their chosen “queen’s” section, bringing an added layer of fun and energy before the show even began. The space was transformed into a vibrant concert arena, which created a fantastic vibe from the outset.

Many of the cast were already familiar faces on the College stage. Blossom, Lily, Molly GF and Sienna wowed crowds at this year’s Gig on the Green; Betsy and Molly H previously shared the title role in Matilda (2023); and both Kendall and Ellie were standout stars in last year’s production of Legally Blonde. Their experience showed, with polished performances and commanding stage presence. Just as exciting, however, was the emergence of new talent - Jess, Niamh, Tiffany and Connie stepped into their roles with real confidence, and we hope they continue to perform at College.



Behind the scenes, an exceptional technical and creative team ensured the production ran seamlessly. Mr White and Mr Garfitt once again volunteered their time to deliver professional-standard sound and lighting, supported by an outstanding student crew: Tom D, Hayden, Sophia and Toby. The props - most notably the stunning crowns and thrones - were designed and created by students during Monday evening Enrichment, working under the expert guidance of Mr Riley. Each piece was meticulously crafted to reflect the personality and story of its queen. Our thanks also go to Mrs Leeson, Ms Galway and parent Mrs Brewis for their help with the costumes and Mrs Cusick for resplendent crowns for the Queens.

The overall result was a show bursting with energy, humour and heart. Every performer brought her own interpretation to her queen, whipping up the audience to clap, cheer, laugh, cry and even dance along.

If the audience reaction was anything to go by, this production will not simply be remembered, it will go down in “HER”story as one of the College’s most impressive shows to date.

# IB AND SIXTH FORM

## Record numbers at our Sixth Form Open event and IB Taster Day

Scarborough College recently welcomed a fantastic turnout of students and families to our IB Open Event, designed for Year 11 pupils exploring their options for Sixth Form study. With all our IB subject teachers on hand, visitors were able to gather detailed advice, guidance and insight into the International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme (IBDP), including its core components: CAS (Creativity, Activity, Service), the Extended Essay and Theory of Knowledge.

Throughout the evening, teachers highlighted the key differences between the IB and A Levels. While A Levels focus on three subjects in depth, the IB requires students to study six subjects across distinct groups - including languages, sciences, humanities and the arts - offering a broader academic experience. As an IB-only school, Scarborough College delivers the Diploma Programme exclusively, with the option to study BTEC Sport alongside Higher Level subjects for those looking to combine academic rigour with practical specialism.

The evening was extremely busy, with a wonderful mix of our own Year 11 and Year 10 families, as well as many external visitors, some of whom were stepping inside the College for the very first time. Headmaster Mr Emmett and Deputy Head for IB and Sixth Form, Ms Katie Cooke, both spoke during the event, explaining the advantages - and the intellectual challenge - of this truly global qualification.

Following the success of the open evening, our Year 11 students took part in the IB Taster Day on 28 November. This gave them the chance to experience a day in the life of a Sixth Former, attending IB lessons, meeting new teachers and spending time working in the Sixth Form Centre. As well as offering a taste of Sixth Form independence, the day allowed students to understand more clearly how their school experience will evolve next year.

Feedback was overwhelmingly positive. Many students commented on how much they enjoyed the change of pace, the variety of subjects and the more mature learning environment. Quite a few even claimed to have already chosen their preferred study-centre seat for next year.

Both events showcased what makes the Sixth Form at Scarborough College such an exciting and supportive place to continue learning.

# BUSINESS

## A busy and practical term of learning

This term has been full of applied learning experiences for our Business Studies students, who have combined classroom theory with hands-on enterprise activities and focused exam preparation.

Early in the term, Year 11 students took part in a revision workshop delivered by Helen and Carlo from Time2Resources. The session focused on strengthening exam technique, with clear guidance on approaches that work well and common pitfalls to avoid. Each student received a workbook filled with practice questions, giving them the opportunity to consolidate their learning and feel more confident in tackling the demands of GCSE papers.

The highlight of the term was the Mini Enterprise event on 10 December. After covering topics such as marketing, risk and reward, budgeting, and planning, students were challenged to apply these concepts by running their own small businesses for a day. They were responsible for designing their stalls, sourcing equipment and stock, and promoting their ideas to the school community. Importantly, students invested their own money in their ventures, creating genuine commitment and encouraging careful decision-making.

The event itself was largely student-led, with minimal intervention from staff, giving participants the chance to manage real-time problem solving, adapt to changing circumstances, and collaborate effectively to meet their goals. This practical experience helped students understand the realities of running an enterprise, from managing costs to attracting customers.

Stalls on the day were varied, including a chocolate fountain, handmade bracelets, stickers, mini-golf, rugby passing challenges, hockey shooting games, water sponge throws, and more.

Overall, the term has given students a valuable combination of academic preparation and practical enterprise, all serving to strengthen their broader business skills.





## BookBuzz brings fun to reading

This term, our Year 7 and 8 students took part in the BookTrust's BookBuzz initiative. This annual programme is designed to encourage reading for pleasure by giving each pupil the chance to choose their own book from a specially curated selection.

To help them decide, students took part in a lively "book speed dating" session. With just two minutes with each title, they had to read the blurbs, explore covers and quickly size up the stories on offer before moving on to the next one. The library was a relatively noisy place for a change as students compared notes, swapped recommendations and tried to narrow down their favourites.

The BookBuzz initiative has once again proved a fun and engaging way to promote reading across the lower school, encouraging them to continue their reading journey.

# ART

## IB Visual Arts Students Explore London's Creative Landscape

Our IB Visual Arts students enjoyed an inspiring and action-packed trip to London this half term, designed to deepen their engagement with the visual world and broaden the creative thinking that sits at the heart of the Diploma Programme.

The day began with an early minibus ride to York Station, followed by a train to London - delays included - but spirits remained high. After navigating the tube to Leicester Square, students grabbed lunch and braved the torrential rain to explore the city, taking in festive Christmas markets and soaking up the vibrant atmosphere.

A highlight of the trip was the visit to Tate Modern, an essential destination for any Visual Arts student. Here, the group explored a wide range of contemporary works, from large-scale installations and sculpture to painting, printmaking and textiles. Observing these pieces firsthand is a vital part of the IB Visual Arts experience, as the course asks students to analyse, compare and reflect on global artistic practices while developing their own studio work. The subject demands both critical investigation and creative production, making real-world exposure to professional art environments especially valuable.

After leaving the gallery, students enjoyed a moonlit walk along the Thames before returning to King's Cross. A final stop for food at the station's restaurants and markets rounded off the evening, followed by the train back to York and the bus home.

Everyone thoroughly enjoyed the trip - not only for the opportunity to explore modern art in depth, but also for the chance to experience one of the world's most dynamic cultural cities.

## Roundup from our Director of Sport

From our youngest teams to our senior squads competing on the national stage, this has been a term marked by consistency, progress and strong performances across the sporting programme at Scarborough College. As our fixture list grows, our students continue to meet every challenge with determination. Many have represented their counties and countries, and several teams have once again reached national-level competitions.

Highlights include our U18 Boys' Indoor Hockey team placing 3rd nationally after a narrow semi-final loss on shuffles, following a 1-1 draw. The U15 Cricket team finished 4th nationally in the T20 competition, while our U18 Rugby squad reached the National Quarter Finals, with the U15 and U14 teams progressing to the last 16. ## Honouring a Lifetime of Service: Dave Simpson's Retirement

At the end of term, Scarborough College said a fond farewell to Dave Simpson, a much-valued and long-serving member of our Estates team, whose career reflects the strong sense of family and community that lies at the heart of the College.

Dave began working at Bramcote School in 1983, following in the footsteps of his father, who first joined the school in 1972 and was responsible for maintaining the grounds. When Scarborough College merged with Bramcote in 2012, Dave became part of the wider College team, continuing to care for the same grounds with pride, dedication and an unwavering commitment to the school community. In total, the Simpson family has given more than five decades of service to Bramcote and Scarborough College, a remarkable legacy by any measure.



To mark Dave's 42 years of service, and to honour the contribution of both Dave and his father from 1972 to 2025, the field at the Bramcote Athletics Facility has been renamed Simpsons Field. A plaque was unveiled to commemorate the occasion, providing a lasting tribute to a family whose work has quietly shaped the daily life of the school for generations.

Dave's retirement is a moment of pride and gratitude, but he will be greatly missed by colleagues across the College. His story reflects a wider truth about Scarborough College: we are fortunate to be a community where long service is valued and loyalty runs deep. Another member of the Estates team is approaching 48 years of service, while our longest-serving teacher has been with us for over 25 years, alongside many others who have dedicated more than a decade to the College.

We thank Dave for his outstanding service and wish him a long, happy and well-earned retirement.
